
Eno River Association 2025 Board Nomination Slate

Helen Kalevas

Helen Kalevas has a Master of Science Degree from Northern Arizona University specializing in Avian Ecology where she had also acquired a Bachelor of Science Degree in Biology. While obtaining her education, she worked as a river guide/cook on the Colorado River in Grand Canyon which led her to conduct scientific research along the Colorado River for over 20 years. She has several peer reviewed publications on bird studies which included studying birds on several other rivers and riparian areas in the southwest. In addition to research projects, she volunteered for non-profit organizations such as the Museum of Northern Arizona where she organized large fundraising events.
